

Lyle Earns State Ecology Award

Klickitat PUD (KPUD) received notice from the Washington Department of Ecology that the community of Lyle's wastewater treatment plant has been selected to receive an "Outstanding Wastewater Treatment Plant" award.

Of approximately 300 wastewater treatment plants in the state, Lyle's is ranked among 55 that achieved full compliance with its discharge permit in 2006.

The DOE's staff evaluated each treatment plant for compliance with its effluent limits, monitoring and reporting requirements, spill prevention planning, pretreatment and other regulatory activities.

The Lyle wastewater treatment plant is monitored by KPUD's state certified water-wastewater system

operators. Our highly qualified operators are Tim McMurrin, Eric Shea and Howard Sinor. They also monitor wastewater treatment plants in the towns of Klickitat, Roosevelt, Glenwood and Wishram. Additional KPUD staff support includes Project Manager Doug Miller—who has been with KPUD for 30 years—and Tim Furlong, the new water-wastewater department supervisor.

The Lyle plant was acquired by KPUD in February 1972, and was rebuilt and completed in 2006.

The new plant was made possible through funding from the Washington Department of Community Trade & Economic Development, and the Department of Ecology's centennial clean water

fund and state revolving loan fund.

The ecology award announcement includes a statement of the department's appreciation for the extraordinary level of effort KPUD's team demonstrated throughout 2006, ensuring outstanding compliance and protection of our state's water quality.

The award reflects KPUD's ongoing efforts to fulfill its mission statement: to adequately collect and treat wastewater to ensure public health and reasonably protect the environment, which will result in maintaining a high level of customer satisfaction.
