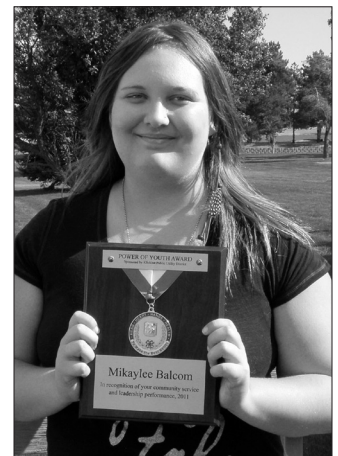
As a utility, there are lots of local contributions made for the communities. KPUD attends parades, fairs and community events throughout the county, including the Huckleberry Festival in Bingen and the Klickitat County Fair in Goldendale. KPUD employees attend these events and bring information about your utility, ongoing or upcoming projects, energy conservation, and distribute handouts and giveaways.

KPUD also attends the HUGS Fair, which is held annually in White Salmon and provides an opportunity for families to gather information on a variety of topics that relate to the health and safety of children through fun, hands-on activities.

Throughout the year, KPUD contributes employees' time, equipment and vehicles to put up and take down holiday decorations, banners and replace lights at ball fields throughout the county.

Special projects seem to arise every year, and the utility responds to these requests as much as it is able.

Each year, KPUD sponsors the Power of Youth Award to a member of the Klickitat County 4-H program. The award is based on the young person's community involvement, volunteer activities and leadership skills. Rewarding the youth for being committed to their community encourages them to continue with a lifetime of volunteerism.

If you have donated blood lately, you may have noticed KPUD has partnered with the American Red Cross and has helped sponsor blood drives.

Employees from KPUD donated about 40 pints of life-saving blood in 2011. The Red Cross sends its sincere "thank you" for each of the individuals who will be able to have surgery, survive a serious accident, or lengthen their life span because of the blood that was collected.

The next scheduled blood drive is January 12 at Community Grace Brethren Church in Goldendale.

Employees are encouraged to take part and interest in civic and community activities on their own time. Here are some examples of how KPUD employees are giving back:

- Howard Sinor also volunteered at the Glenwood Rodeo and loves to participate every year.

- Several volunteer coaches work at KPUD. Jeff Speelman and Greg Watson both donated their time as soccer coaches for AYSO, and Tim McMurrin coached girl's softball.

- Jim Smith volunteered at the Goldendale swimming pool, helping uncover the pool for the summer and covering it for the winter. He also spent many days as head timer at swim meets.
