Local runner Jenny Balcom completes major marathon milestone

Jenny Balcom, a dedicated runner from Klickitat County, has achieved an extraordinary milestone by completing all six World Marathon Majors. Her journey, which began as a personal challenge after quitting smoking, has transformed her into an inspiration for runners everywhere.

Jenny's race began in 2006. She started walking with the modest goal of running a mile. This initial aspiration soon blossomed into a passion for long-distance running. Her first marathon was in Wenatchee. She finished in 4 hours and 9 minutes—she had found her stride.

Her second marathon at the Columbia Gorge saw a remarkable improvement, finishing in 3 hours and 35 minutes. A friend pointed out the time was good enough to qualify for the Boston Marathon. Motivated by the revelation, Jenny again entered the Wenatchee Marathon, and this time officially qualified for the Boston Marathon.

Jenny ran the Boston Marathon in 2015 and again in 2016. The second time, she noticed a fellow runner wearing a prestigious World Major Marathons medal. Inspired, she set a new goal: to complete all six of these iconic races.

The six World Marathon Majors are Tokyo, Boston, Berlin, London, Chicago and New York. Jenny's quest took her to the New York Marathon in 2018 and the Chicago Marathon in 2019.

With the major marathons being extremely popular, some draw lotteries to allocate who can run. In 2022, Jenny ran the Berlin Marathon after being selected in the lottery on her first attempt. However, the London Marathon proved more elusive with seven years of failed lottery attempts. Undeterred, Jenny joined a cancer charity, raising \$5,000 for the American Institute for Cancer Research. Some charities are



given entry slots at the London Marathon, and through this Jenny finally secured her spot. Simultaneously, she entered the lottery for the Tokyo Marathon and was chosen. In a remarkable feat of endurance, she ran both the Tokyo and London marathons just a month apart in the spring of 2024, completing her World Majors journey.

Throughout her marathon career, Jenny has run the Boston Marathon eight times, calling it her favorite and the true "spirit of a marathon." She says she is "holding onto this feeling of accomplishment," but is also considering new challenges such as joining the 7 Continents Marathon Club or running in Athens, the birthplace of the marathon.

Her advice to others: "More people need to be scared and dream big!"

Jenny's favorite memories include not just the races and elite runners but the support she received during her long training runs from her husband, Jared.

"He would drive beside me, handing me things and talking to me," she says. "He really supports me."

Jared's pride in Jenny's achievements is palpable.

"Writing down tasks and managing time efficiently has been crucial," she adds.



"It's exciting to see the calves grow and develop," she says.

Outside of academics, business and agriculture, Lexi's passion lies in rodeo. She competes in breakaway roping and goat tying, showcasing her dedication and skill in horsemanship. Her participation in the county fair over the years further highlights her commitment to agriculture and community.

As Lexi prepares to attend Oregon State University to study business and agriculture, she looks forward to exploring how these fields intersect.

"I hope to make a large impact in whichever direction I go," she says. ■
